Plaques are solid metal, photochemically etched and anodized with a dark bronze background and silver text and detail. Photos and line drawings reproduce well and are featured on many plaques. Let me ask each of you this question. What have you done to make those younger members want to join our group? What have you done to make any of them feel welcome when they have joined? We are members of an organization that none of us own. If we are selfish with our toys, others will just take their ball and go home. We owe it to the memory of what was accomplished to share that gift. OR, like a family without any children, that legacy to will

vanish.


THE OLD OUTFIT

How Does Your USS New Jersey Scholarship Work?

By Brian Fogelson, Scholarship Chair

I've been asked to provide the membership with a brief description of how our scholarship works. It's relatively simple.

Up to now, the applications have been either obtained through the *Jersey Bounce* or directly on line at www.ussnewjersey.org. Completed applications have been returned to my attention. After the deadline for application, the applications are forwarded to the committee members. We then read the applications and scan them for several key factors:

- 1. The student's overall Grade Point Average (GPA). Is this weighted or unweighted.
- 2. The student's class rank.
- 3. The difficulty of the student's course load. A student who has a 3.6 average and has taken Advanced Placement (AP) courses or a full load of Honors courses will stand a better chance than a student who has not taken the most challenging courses that his/her school offers.
- 4. Next, we look at activities. We are looking for well-rounded students. These students have achieved academically, while participating in athletics, music, drama, community activities, or their church or synagogue.
- 5. Recommendations count as well. Students solicit recommendations from favorite teachers, counselors, etc.
- 6. We read the essay carefully. Students who are very focused in their future plans usually rate better than those who are attending college with no particular major in mind.

After we've read all the applications and ranked them individually, we confer and compare notes. It's usually amazing to me that we usually come down to the same two or three students. We often have them ranked in the same order. In that case, it's easy. When we don't, we talk about the candidates and discuss their relative strengths and weaknesses and reach a consensus decision. That's the process in a nutshell.

Carolyn Lilley, Jack Feys, and Joe Santucci have been part of the selection team over the past number of years. I would like to publicly thank them for their service.

- 4. Two (2) Academic References
- 5. Student's Personal Resume
- 6. Student's Hand Written Essay
- 7. Name of Educational / Technical Institution you will attend
- 8. June 1, 2006 is the last date to request a Scholarship Application.
- 9. Scholarship winners will be notified by phone and a follow-up letter from the President of the USS New Jersey Veterans Inc.

DD-214 Available On-Line

The National Personnel Records Center (NPRC) has provided the following web site for veterans to gain access their DD-214 on-line:

http://vetrecs.archives.gov

The National Personnel Records Center is working to make it easier for veterans with computers and Internet access to obtain copies of documents from their military files. Military veterans and the next of kin of deceased former military members may now use a new on-line military personnel records system to request documents. Other individuals with a need for documents must still complete the Standard Form 180, which can be downloaded from the on-line web site.

Because the requester will be asked to supply all information essential for NPRC to process the request, delays that normally occur when NPRC has to ask veterans for additional information will be minimized. The new web-based application was designed to provide better service on these requests by eliminating the records center's mailroom processing time.

V A Awards Grants For Homeless Programs

Ships of the Today's United States Navy

USS Green Bay LPD 20

The LPD 20 USS Green Bay is being built at Northrop Grumman Ship Systems, Avondale Division, New Orleans, Louisiana.

Following a Navy tradition of naming ships of this class after American cities, LPD 20 is named Green Bay to honor the nation's Midwest "city by the bay."

"Green Bay may be modest in size but it is enormous in spirit," said Danzig. "The oldest community in Wisconsin, Green Bay is well known for its commitment to team efforts, and particularly for its support of its football teams. As Vince Lombardi, a Green Bay coach, put it, 'The achievements of an organization are the results of the combined effort of each individual.'

The San Antonio class amphibious transport dock ships are used to transport and land Marines, their equipment and supplies by embarked landing craft or amphibious vehicles augmented by helicopters in amphibious assault.

These versatile ships perform the mission of amphibious transports, amphibious cargo ships and the older dock landing ships (LSD) by incorporating both a flight deck and a well deck that can be ballasted and deballasted to support landing craft.



The 12 ships of the San Antonio class will provide greatly improved warfighting capabilities including an advanced command and control suite, a greatly increased lift capacity, including substantial increases in vehicle and cargo carrying capability, and advanced ship

survivability features. These ships have been designed from the keel up to support the Marine Corps 'mobility triad' - the LCAC (Landing Craft Air Cushion vehicle), 'Triple A-V' (AAAV - Advanced Amphibious Assault Vehicle), and MV-22 (Osprey tiltrotor aircraft). The LPD 17 class ships are scheduled to replace the older LPD 4 class.

The San Antonio class design integrates the latest in command, control, communications, computers, intelligence, surveillance and reconnaissance (C4ISR) capability. These capabilities are further enhanced by additional, dedicated intelligence, mission planning, and command and control spaces. The shipboard wide area network (SWAN) developed for LPD 17 is a fiber optic shipwide large area computer network.

This highly reliable, warfare-capable ship class will be the most survivable amphibious vessel ever put to sea. The ship's automated combat system includes a highly capable sensor suite and weapons capability that provides for a robust self defense capability. LPD 17's design optimizes radar cross section signature by streamlining topside design and incorporating reduced radar cross section signature technologies including a boat valley instead of boat deck, removable coverings over the rescue boat and fueling at sea stations, and accommodation ladders that fold into the ship's hull. The advanced enclosed mast/sensors, which enclose the ship's radars and communications antennas, characterizes the ship's distinctive profile.
