



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Minutes of the USS New Jersey Association General Meeting August 23, 2004 Doubletree Hotel 1973 Craigshire Road St. Louis, MO 63146

President Steve Sheehan called the meeting to order at 10 AM on Saturday, August 23, 2014. He welcomed the attendees and led the group in the Pledge of Allegiance. Mr. Danny Fielder provided an invocation.

President Sheehan stated that with the passing of Secretary A.J. Smith, the Board was recommending that Phil Tasker be elected to serve the remainder of Secretary Smith's term. Mr. Tasker was elected Secretary upon a motion by Ray Kehoe as seconded by Bob Williams. Following the election, newly installed Secretary Tasker read the minutes of the previous meeting, which were approved.

Vice President Bob Dingman gave a presentation on the plaque to be presented to the Navy Memorial in Washington DC. He stated that the costs had been covered through donations including \$1,325 that had been received at the reunion and that a matching grant would cover any shortfall. He stated that excess funds received would be transferred to the scholarship fund. He noted that the Memorial would be dedicated December 7, 2014 in Washington DC and that a number of USS New Jersey Veterans Association members were planning to attend. He said that he would provide more information in the Bounce regarding the dedication ceremony for those that wished to attend.

There was a question from the floor regarding the availability of a replica of the plaque. Vice President Dingman reported that the organization has the rights to the graphics and that he will check on the costs to produce a replica, either as a plaque or in some other media. President Sheehan complimented the attendees for their financial response to this project.

President Sheehan updated the membership on activities to rehabilitate the ships teak decks. He reported that he was on the museum's Board and that they were initiating a "Dollars for Decks" program and asked that if anyone would like to volunteer to serve as the USS New Jersey Veterans Association coordinator for this program to contact him.

Master at Arms Ray Kehoe discussed the financial bonding of directors. He estimated the cost to be less than \$500 annually and that the money would be well spent to protect the assets of the organization. He moved that the organization authorize obtaining a financial bond as long as the cost did not exceed the \$500 estimate. The motion carried after a second by Ken Hobbs from the floor.

President Sheehan announced the awarding of three scholarships for 2014. He reported that Jessica Kennedy of Sharpsburg, Georgia whose grandfather, George Komer served on the ship in N Division during World W II, Andrew Guarente of Peabody, Massachusetts whose grandfather Blair Schetrompf served in K Division during the Lebanon era, and Mason Kapelanski of Sykesville, Maryland whose grandfather Gerald Lee Barton also served on the ship were awarded the scholarships. He detailed their college plans and anticipated majors.

President Sheehan reminded the attendees that the 2015 reunion will be held in Portland, Oregon August 18 through the 23rd, 2015 and that the 2016 reunion is scheduled to the ship in accordance with the bylaws. He asked that for preliminary planning purposes if there were any suggestions that could be investigated for the 2017 reunion. There was a suggestion from the floor identifying the Chicago area and specifically, northwestern Illinois so as to attend a recruit training center graduation at the Great Lakes Navel Training Center. There was also a suggestion that perhaps the organization look at New Orleans. There was a general discussion of the opportunities of both potential venues and Vice President and Reunion Coordinator Dingman stated that he would investigate both areas but would welcome any assistance that could be provided. Danny Fielder offered to assist in researching the New Orleans area.

There was a further discussion initiated from the floor about reunion planning, timing and location within the general geographic area selected. The discussion included suggestions about having the reunion on the ship more often. President Sheehan said that the by-laws require the reunion to be held at the ship every four years but the membership could vote to attend any of the other three years as well without the need for a by-law change. There was also commentary about holding the USS New Jersey reunion in conjunction with other battleship reunions. Vice President and Reunion Coordinator Dingman stated that he had been involved in such discussions but the overall coordination could be challenging. He stated that he would continue dialogues with other groups and would keep the membership informed.

Past President and past Reunion Coordinator Joe DiMaria asked to address the membership. He stated that the membership needed to recognize that there are a number of trade-offs involved in planning and scheduling any reunion. He stated that traditionally the reunion organizers have focused on minimizing costs, which generally limits most other options and requires concessions as to timing and the location of the specific venue within the geographic area selected. He stated that the Reunion Organizers always try to maximize the value proposition. He asked the membership to assist, when possible in planning reunions in their general locale.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 10:55 AM upon a motion by Secretary Tasker upon a second from the floor by Jm Barnett.



WEDNESDAY



Immediately after the opening prayer Dan Fielder provided an appropriate reading "Remember Me But Let Me Go."



At the conclusion of the service Mr. Paul "Bugle Boy" Hobbs played Taps







Saturday night's banquet was an elegant evening. Everyone dressed up, you wouldn't guess half the group was sailors!


Then time to say so long for another year, and reunite in 12 months in Portland Oregon. Hope to see many of you there especially those of you living in the western states







MESSAGE FROM THE NEWS EDITOR

Since being elected as the News Editor in 2008, I have spent a significant amount of time drafting, publishing, and mailing the Bounce. Having an extensive technical background didn't adequately prepare me for the intensive labor required to publish a quality product.

I have exerted a great effort in trying to upgrade each issue and make it appear impressive, informative, and something that members would look forward to receiving. I have searched the Navy Memorial, Navy Shipyard and the National Archives in an effort to provide interesting information about our ship and little known historical incidents i.e... "Japanese Aircraft Bombing the United States Homeland during WW II".

I have attempted to delineate what our members would feel is important and not just fluff.

Each issue emphasizes the reunion which is a very important function for this organization. However, only about 6% - 16% of the members attend these reunions.

The organization has made some positive transformations and great strides in bringing the management of both USS New Jersey and our organization closer together. Two important management changes have occurred.

First - - the Board Of Directors for the USS New Jersey has added our President, Steve Sheehan to their Board. This is a very positive and important moves. It brings the two organizations closer together and removes conflicting barriers.

Second - - the ship's Historian, Jason Hall, has been asked to join our organization as our Historian. Fortunately, Jason accepted the position.

Several factors have brought my attention to the fact that the format being using to draft the Bounce might not in the best interest of our members. I think that the members would appreciate more information about the health, welfare, and future plans for the ship than reunion events.

Salute to Doolittle Raiders

Colonel Richard Cole, a 98-year old ex-Air Force Pilot, to accept the Congressional Gold Medal on behalf of the 80 Airmen that bombed Japan April 18, 1942

Colonel Cole, one of only 4 remaining members of the Doolittle Raid, flew in to Washington from his home in Texas to be the Grand Marshal in Mondays Memorial Day Parade and accept the Congressional Gold Medal on behalf of the Raiders.

Colonel Cole stated that it is a great honor to be selected to be the Grand Marshal and accept the Congressional Gold Medal for the Raiders. He reiterated that the honor was joyful but also a bit lonely.

"It's not a well known story anymore," said James Roberts, president of the American Veterans Center, which is helping to coordinate a documentary film about the raid. Colonel Cole recalls that after dropping their bombs on Tokyo and surrounding cities the planes ran into stormy weather in route to China. As they approached China Doolittle ordered the crew to bail out. It was night and he had NO idea if he was going to land in the South China Sea or on land.

Looking down into the darkness he pulled the rip cord so hard that he gave himself a black eye. He landed in a pine tree and dangled about 12 feet above the ground until some sympathetic Chinese villagers rescued him.

Last November the Raiders ended a tradition of reunions as the four remaining survivors toasted the memory of their fallen comrades with a drink of cognac bottled in 1896, the year that Jimmy Doolittle was born. The bottle of cognac and associated goblets were then flown to be displayed at the Wright Patterson Air Force Museum in Dayton, Ohio

A True Story's Of Guadalcanal

October 26, 1942

One Hill: One Marine.

On Nov. 15, 2003, an 85-year-old retired Marine Corps Colonel died of congestive heart failure at his home in La Quinta, Calif., southeast of Palm Springs.

He was a combat veteran of World War II. Reason enough to honor him. But this Marine was a little different. This Marine was Colonel Mitchell Paige.

It's hard today to envision -- or, for the dwindling few, to remember -what the world looked like on October 26, 1942.

The U.S. Navy was not the most powerful fighting force in the Pacific. Not by a long shot. So the Navy basically dumped a few thousand Marines on the beach at Guadalcanal to Sink or Swim.

As Platoon Sgt. Mitchell Paige and his 33 riflemen set about carefully placing their four water-cooled .30caliber Browning machine guns, manning their section of the thin khaki line which was expected to defend Henderson Field against the assault of the night of 25 Oct 1942, it's unlikely anyone thought they were about to provide the definitive answer to that most desperate of questions: How many able-bodied U.S. Marines does it take to hold a hill against 2,000 desperate and motivated Japanese attackers?

Nor did the commanders of the Japanese Army, who had swept everything before them for decades, expect their advance to be halted on some jungle ridge manned by one thin line of Marines

But by the time the night was over, reports stated that the Japanese 29th Infantry Regiment has lost 553 killed or missing and 479 wounded from its initial 2,554 men, The Japanese 16th Regiment's losses were uncounted, but the [US] 164th's burial parties handled 975 Japanese bodies. ... The American estimate of 2,200 Japanese dead was probably too low.

Among the 90 American dead and seriously wounded that night were all the men in Mitchell Paige's platoon. As the night of endless attacks wore on, Paige moved up and down his line, pulling his dead and wounded comrades back into their foxholes and firing a few bursts from each of the four Brownings in turn, convincing the Japanese forces down the hill that the positions were still manned.

The citation for Paige's Medal of Honor Citation defines the event: "When the enemy broke through the line directly in front of his position, Platoon Sgt. Paige, commanding a machine gun section with fearless determination, continued to direct the fire of his gunners until all his men were either killed or wounded. Alone, against the deadly hail of Japanese shells, he fought with tenacity, when one machine gun was destroyed, he took over another, moving from gun to gun, never ceasing his withering fire."

In the end, Sgt. Paige picked up the last of the 40-pound, belt-fed Browning and did something for which the weapon was never designed. Sgt. Paige walked down

the hill toward a place where he could hear the last Japanese survivors rallying to move around his flank, the belt-fed gun cradled under his arm, firing as he went.

Neither Sgt. Paige nor the weapon failed.

At dawn, battalion executive officer Major Odell M. Conoley was first to discover the answer to our question:

How many able-bodied Marines does it take to hold a hill against two regiments of motivated, combathardened Japanese infantrymen who have never known defeat?

On a hill where the bodies were piled like cordwood, Sgt. Mitchell Paige sat alone behind his 30-caliber Browning, waiting to see what the dawn would bring.

One hill: One Marine.

"In the early morning light, the enemy could be seen a few yards off, and vapor from the barrels of their machine guns was clearly visible."

Major Odell M. Conoley decided to rush the Japanese position." For this task, the Major gathered together "three enlisted communication personnel, several riflemen, a few company runners who were at the point, together with a cook and a few mess-men, who had brought food to the position the evening before." Joined by Paige, this ad hoc force of 17 Marines counterattacked at 5:40 A.M.., discovering that at this extremely short range the use of grenades was the optimum weapon.

They cleared the ridge. That's when the previously unstoppable wave of Japanese conquests finally broke and began to retreat. On an unnamed jungle ridge on an insignificant island no one had ever heard of, called Guadalcanal.

But who remembers, today the ridge held by a single Marine, in the autumn of 1942?

The Hasbro Toy Company contacted Colonel Paige asking permission to put the retired Colonel's face on some kid's doll,

Mitchell Paige thought they must be joking. But they weren't.

The Hasbro Company quickly made the toy available for sale prior to Christmas 1964. The company was afraid that boys wouldn't play with dolls therefore they called the doll an Action Figure. Initially it sold for \$ 4.00 and was a big hit.

Yes, that is Platoon Sargent Paige's face on the original Marine Action Figure that the Hasbro Company called:

'G.I. Joe'

\$300,000 Received to Help Restore and Market The Battleship

The Battleship New Jersey Museum and Memorial has received a check for \$300,000 from the Battleship New Jersey Historical Museum Society. Vince Falso, a Korean War Veteran of the ship, and Larry Engel, a U.S. Army Veteran, presented the check to Phil Rowan, Executive Director on May 24th. These funds will be used to help pay for the restoration of the ship's teak wood deck, paint the ship's exterior including the visible hull, and market the ship to visitors.

The Museum staff plans to commence the replacement of the deteriorated deck wood on the forward area of the main deck. Carpenters will be removing the old deteriorated wood, most of which is Douglas–Fir, installed by the U.S. Navy on the ship during its two final periods in commission. Most of the teak that was installed by the Navy is in good condition.

Guests will be able to watch as the carpenters remove the old wood and install the new two-inch thick teak. It is hoped that guests will make donations on the deck so that the work can continue until all of the deteriorated wood on the deck has been replaced. The "Dollars for the

Decks" campaign is continuing with over \$250,000 raised or committed so far. The goal is to replace all of the bad wood on the decks, which is estimated to cost \$2 million.

The exterior of the superstructure has been painted. With the funding from the Society, the ship will have its visible hull covered in a fresh coat of paint. This new paint job will make the ship look sharp and will protect the visible part of the hull from deterioration. When the ship is dry-docked in 2017 - 2018, the entire hull will be inspected, repaired, blasted to bright metal and receive six coats of primer and hightech paint.

\$100,000 of the grant money from the Society, will be used to develop a comprehensive marketing program to reach out to potential visitors and event planners. Historically, marketing funding have been difficult to obtain therefore this grant, from the Society, will help make the program financially sustainable.

On behalf of all of the supporters of the Battleship New Jersey, we want to thank the Battleship New Jersey Historical Museum Society for this vital and timely funding.

Curator's Corner

On Friday, May 23 the first official "Stroll Down Broadway" occurred as part of the 71st Anniversary celebration of the first commissioning of the Battleship New Jersey. This "stroll", added to the end of the current Turret II Experience tour route, takes guests down ³/₄ of the long passageway known as Broadway that accesses the engineering spaces of the ship, The purpose of opening up Broadway is to elicit excitement, and possible financial donations, for the upcoming new engineering tour we hope to open next year.

The spaces onboard the Battleship New Jersey that are the most requested to be visited by our guests are the engineering spaces; particularly the boiler and engine rooms. They want to know the answers to the following questions: How does a ship three football fields long, weighing 57,000 tons, move through the water at over 40 mph? Currently the engineering spaces are not open to the general public. The "Stroll Down Broadway" is limited to just Broadway, and does not include any fire rooms or engine rooms. It will take a substantial amount of money, time, and energy to open up the new engineering tour we have planned.

The new guided "Steam to Speed Tour" onboard our nation's longest and most decorated battleship, the USS New Jersey, will immerse guests into a one of a kind museum experience. The success of the interactive Turret II Experience, that opened on the Battleship in 2013, set the bar for all other historic ship museums. We intend to set the bar even higher in 2015 with the new Steam to Speed engineering tour. Participants of this new guided tour will not just merely look at the shipboard propulsion mechanics, but rather engage in hands on activities that will help bring to life the machinery that propelled the ship allowing it to provide Firepower for Freedom.

The tour will take guests down to the 3rd Deck to Central Station, one of four locations on the Battleship where the ship can be steered and the ship's speed controlled. While in Central Station guests will learn how the ship was steered through electro-hydraulic movement of the rudder. This will be demonstrated to the guests by actually having them put their hands on the helm (wheel) and engine order telegraph, both of which will be augmented by new audio and visual aspects to give the illusion to our guests that they are actually controlling the speed and direction of the Battleship.

From Central Station the tour continues to the adjacent compartment that houses Damage Control Central. Damage control is the responsibility of ALL HANDS, from the Commanding Officer down to the newest recruit. Effective Damage Control (DC) requires the correct use of equipment to prevent or minimize the damage caused by battle, fire, collision, explosions, etc. All of the above is controlled from DC Central. We hope to bring life to several of the communication implements and other hardware located, in this space, in an effort to enhance the guest's understanding of DC Central.

Walking back through Central Station the tour enters Broadway, the longest passageway onboard the Battleship. Once the new engineering tour is open, Broadway will be taken off the Turret II Experience tour. Broadway provides main access to each of the four Fire Rooms (boilers) and four separate Engine Rooms. Our preliminary concept calls for a series of video monitors along the tour route, beginning in the first compartment of Broadway, that will "follow a drop of water" on its journey from the ocean to the boilers illustrating how sea water is utilized to generate 212,000 shaft horsepower! Each video will help enhance the Tour Guide's presentation by utilizing historic images, as well as modern computer generated imagery. The videos will show how the ship intakes salt water from the ocean and desalinates the water in order that it can be used by the boilers to create the steam that will turn the screws that propel the ship through the water.

The next stop on the tour is a Fire Room. Descending down two ladders guests will be in awe as they find themselves standing in front of an over two story tall Babcock & Wilcox M-type Boiler that created 600 pounds of steam pressure per square inch! The boiler consists of metal drums, headers and tubes for controlling steam pressure and temperature. It contains a furnace with casing and uptake; steam and water drums; a superheater, and all piping and accessories needed to ensure an ample supply of the three requirements to make steam: fuel, water and air.

Though dormant today, it is our goal to breathe new life into the boiler utilizing state of the art equipment to create a similar environment that the sailors of the Battleship themselves lived and worked in. Guests will feel heat, see steam, and take on the role of an actual Battleship sailor by engaging in a hands on activity where they insert a fuel injector directly into the front of the boiler. The guests will literally hold in their hands the means by which the Battleship was able to produce the power that enabled her to cruise around the world.

The tour will then descend another ladder to the lowest deck of the ship. As they walk among the countless pumps and valves, guests will walk underneath one of the Battleship's massive propeller shafts, and even be able to touch it, a first for any historic naval ship museum! By walking through a new access door, which we must cut through the bulkhead to do, guests will enter into the bottom of an Engine Room. As previously stated, video monitors will continue to guide the guests on the journey that the drop of sea water took in becoming steam and now being used to turn the huge turbines and reduction gears that rotate the propeller shaft.


As in the Fire Room, we intend to install equipment in the Engine Room that creates the noise and other aspects of what it would be like to work in this space. Thanks to proposed cut outs in the coverings of the turbines, and removal of the covers for the reduction gears, guests will pear inside and see a world few have ever experienced. The addition of fiber optic lighting will allow guests to see how the turbines and gears would turn which rotated the propeller shaft and propelled the ship through the water.

Walking on the original catwalk guests will be taken to the Control Console (throttle board). The throttle board is the gas peddle for the engine. There are two wheels; the larger is used for forward direction and the smaller for reverse. Guests will be asked to put there hands on the larger wheel, the 'gas pedal", and turn it. By turning the wheel, thanks to newly installed A/ V equipment augmenting the original gear, the gauges of the throttle board and the engine order telegraph will come alive. Guests will feel as if they are answering a call from the Bridge to increase speed, and they will turn the wheel and send more steam to the engines. As the speed increases the deck will vibrate beneath them and the noise of the engines will increase. This will all occur through the use of existing original ship's equipment, new A/V aspects, and video monitors.

Returning to Broadway via a newly installed ladder, guests will be given an overview of everything they experienced on the tour. A final video will recap the journey of the drop of water from the ocean, through the intakes, into the evaporator, to the boiler where it becomes steam, and then finally to the Engine Room where it turns the turbine and reduction gears that allows the 17' diameter propeller to rotate. No other current historic naval ship museum has an experience that even comes close to what we are proposing. Though the above is merely a conception that will evolve over time, we are excited to complete the mission of the Battleship New Jersey Museum by taking our guests into the engineering spaces with our new Steam to Speed Tour!





Our Sister Ship Acknowledged For Shelling Japanese Homeland During WW II

Lewiston Men Aboard USS Iowa When She Shelled Japan



Two Lewiston navy men, Seaman Bruce Miller, son of Mr. and Mrs. Loren W. Miller, and Ivan Kenneth Brown, gunner's mate, of 1417 7th avenue, brought aboard this 45,000-ton battleship when she and other 3rd fleet battleships, cruisers and destroyers staged a daring midnight bombardment of industiral targets just 70 miles from Tokyo.

Standing just a few miles offshore, the Iowa hurled more than 200 tons of flaming projectiles at war factories. A few days before the ship's big guns had wrecked the port and industrial city of Muroran on Hokkaido island. The Iowa has taken part in many naval actions since her launching, nine months after Pearl harbor.

My Dad's name was Ivan K. Brown and this is from his hometown newspaper.

The son of Donna and Robert Guarente of Peabody Massachusetts.





It is with sadness and sincere regret that Capt. Fredric Jonasz advised the organization of the loss of Capt. Robert C. Peniston, USN (Ret). As a Wardroom member of the USS Albany (CG 10) Capt. Jonasz heard and observed the extraordinary pride and satisfaction That Capt. Peniston projected whenever he spoke of USS New Jersey.

Capt. Peniston dream came to fruition on August 27, 1969 as he assumed command of the USS New Jersey. He had experienced a Midshipmen cruise aboard this great ship and upon graduation from the Naval Academy his first duty station was the Jersey. Now from a midshipman and Ensign he was the commander of the greatest battleship ever built.

Unfortunately, the dream was very short lived as he had the responsibility of taking the ship to Puget Sound Naval Shipyard and on September 8,1969 decommissioned the ship. During the decommissioning ceremony he issued these famous words, "**Rest** Well, Yet Sleep Lightly; and Hear The Call, If Again Sounded, To Provide Firepower For Freedom."

Capt. Peniston departed the Jersey and assumed command of the USS Albany CG -10.

Capt. Peniston retired from active duty June 1, 1976 and became the Director of the Lee Chapel, Washington and Lee University, Lexington, Virginia.

Capt. Fredric Jonasz served under Capt. Peniston aboard the USS Albany. He can recall many of the sea stories that Capt. Peniston told of his days aboard the Jersey.

Capt. Jonasz was extremely found of Capt. Peniston and said that the world and especially the United States had lost a great leader.

Theodore Van Kirk, Enola Gay Navigator, Dies at age 93

Theodore (Dutch) Van Kirk, the navigator and last surviving crew member of the Enola Gay that dropped the atomic bomb on Hiroshima in the last days of World War II died at his home in Stone Mountain, GA. His son confirmed the death. In the predawn hours of August 6, 1945 the Enola Gay, piloted by Col. Paul W. Tibbets Jr. and carrying a crew of 12, took off from Tinian in the Mariana Islands with a uranium bomb built under extraordinary secrecy in the Manhattan Project.

There has been much controversy over the fact that President Truman gave orders to drop the Atomic Bomb.

Operation *Downfall*, plans for the invasion of the Japanese mainland were the responsibility of Fleet Admiral Chester Nimitz, General of the Army, Douglas MacArthur and the Joint Chiefs of Staff.

These plans were completed and the United States was massing forces for the invasion which was considered to be the most costly in both men and equipment in history,

Every time I go to bed I pray that President Truman had the intestinal fortitude to drop the bomb. Thank God we had a very strong leader not like the weak leaders like we have now.

The bomb saved many sailors, marines, airmen, and soldiers from serious injury or death. In fact many of our crew mates could have been injured or killed during both When the aircraft reached Iwo Jima (as the sun rose) it began to ascent to 31,000 feet.

At 8:15 Japanese time it reached Hiroshima (a city of 250,000 people. It dropped the first atomic bomb and the rest is history.

the invasion and subsequent fighting.

Casualty predictions varied widely but were extremely high. Conservative estimates ran into the millions for the Allied depending on the degree to which Japanese civilians resisted the invasion.

In addition, the Japanese would have suffered unbelievable losses and several predictions indicated that the Japanese as a Nation might never recover.
